

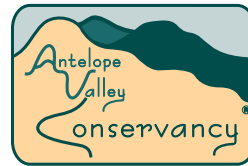

What AVC Does

AVC Cares for Lands (Stewardship)

- Cares for protected lands
- Restores habitats
- Engages the community in stewardship

AVC Funds Preservation

- Secures grant funds to preserve and care for lands
- Accepts donations of land and conservation easements as an IRS Qualified Conservation Organization.
- Operates a state authorized Mitigation Program to acquire and protect lands

AVC Provides Information

- Provides information and resources for landowners and government agencies
- Informs and engages the community in regional land use planning
- Offers community presentations about wildlife and conservation topics



Mission: Antelope Valley Conservancy preserves and stewards land for the public good. We acknowledge future generations' interests in lands that maintain community character, scenic beauty, and representative native habitats, and we acknowledge the right of nature to retain functional habitats and connectivity.

Who

Antelope Valley Conservancy is operated by a volunteer Board of Directors who are local citizens. Advised by regional experts and landowners, AVC's local officers and staff manage projects and operations. Focus volunteer teams include Acquisition and Stewardship, Financial, and Trails. Training for Directors and Officers is provided.

Where

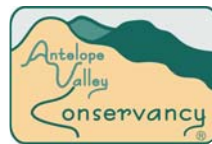
AVC serves northern Los Angeles County and southern Kern County, in California. AVC focuses on the triangular Antelope-Fremont Valleys Watershed and upper reaches of the Upper Santa Clara River Watershed.

Why

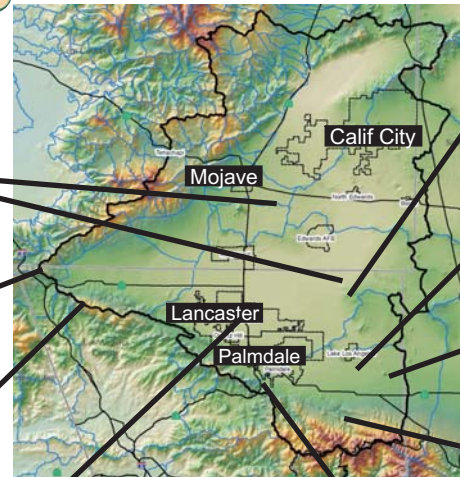
- Habitat preservation protects wildlife and prevents extinctions.
- Healthy ecosystems and access to nature are essential to human health.
- Preserved lands promote property values and economic growth.

Until AVC formed in 2005, there was no local conservancy. Mitigation funds were sent elsewhere and preservation was not implemented locally. AVC has earned Authorization from the California Dept of Fish and Wildlife, and fulfilled mitigation required by Los Angeles County, Kern County, Regional Water Quality Control Board, and local government agencies.
